REA Board of Director Meeting Highlights - December 2017

- Mrs. Nelson reviewed the Financial Report for November 2017. Mrs. Nelson noted
 electric energy revenue was 8% over budget for the month of November. The
 margin for the year is currently about \$100,000 over budget, due to operating
 expense being under budget year-to-date.
- Mrs. Nelson presented the 2017 list of Uncollectible Accounts. Mrs. Nelson noted that efforts continue to collect on accounts even after the account has been written off.
- Mr. Haman presented the December Safety Report and the November

- Operations Report. Mr. Haman reported that the outage count for 2017 is very low with an average of a little more than 30 minutes off per account.
- CEO Dolan and Mrs. Nelson presented the 2018 Budget.

Lights flicker from frost on Jan 25

Falling frost causes powerlines to gallop

There's nothing like a beautiful, frosty January day, as was the case on January 25th. By evening, a heavy frost had developed on trees, tall grasses and powerlines.

"As the evening progressed powerlines throughout our service territory became heavier with frost causing the lines to sag," explains REA Manager of Operations & Engineering Al Haman.



lce and frost on powerlines can lead to flickering and blinking lights.

When the wind came up, the frost began to drop off. "I like to describe what happens next when frost or ice falls from powerlines by using a rubber band as an example," Haman said. When you pull back on one side of a rubber band and let go, it bounces back and forth slapping the other side until it comes to a stop. This slapping action is what our members saw in their homes and business as flickering or blinking of the lights as the powerlines slapped one another. The linemen out on-call saw flashes around the countryside as they witnessed the frost falling from the powerlines."

Quite often this slapping or galloping action caused by nature can cause power outages. Unfortunately, there is not much REA can do to prevent it. Thankfully no power outages resulted from the falling frost on January 25th.

In compliance with Minnesota Adopted Rules relating to Co-generation and Small Power Production, Chapter 7835, Runestone Electric is required to interconnect with and purchase electricity from co-generators and small power producers that satisfy the conditions of a qualified facility. Runestone Electric has available and will provide free information to all interested members regarding rates and interconnection requirements. An application for interconnection is required for a qualifying facility to interconnect and operate in parallel with the cooperative's distribution system and is subject to approval by the cooperative.

Be Safe

Stay clear of downed power lines

POWERFUL STORMS can damage power lines. If you see a downed power line:

- Stay at least 50 feet away from it and assume it is energized. The ground may also be energized making the entire area extremely dangerous.
- Never touch anything that is touching a downed power line. It is as dangerous as the line itself.
- If a power line falls on your vehicle while you are in it, stay inside your vehicle until help arrives.

Always assume its is energized Call 9ll immediately!

In case of a power outage

- Make sure the problem is not on your side (Members may be billed for service calls if the problem is caused by their own equipment).
- Check your own fuses and circuit breakers in your home and by the meter pole (Call us for help if you are unsure of the location of your breakers).
- Check with your neighbors to see if their power is off and if they have reported the outage.
- If the trouble is not on your wiring, please call (800) 473-1722 for 24-hour service.
 Please report any tree branches in lines, twisted wires, broken poles and if your neighbors are also out of power.
- Be sure to have one corded phone in the house, because cordless phones won't work when the power is out.
- Program the number above into your cell phone for easy access.
- Never assume we know you are without power. Alway call to report an outage.
