A Note From Your Board President

The year 2022 brought many challenges to the cooperative. We had three major storms in the spring and early summer. During the peak of the worst one, over half our accounts were without power. CEO Haman will give you much more

information on the storms at the Annual Meeting. The storms caused enough damage that we were able to apply for and be approved for reimbursement from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). We are proud of our employees for the way they handled these storms, working many long hours to restore power as quickly and safely as possible.

We again received a clean report from the financial auditors. At year-end, the total assets of the cooperative were \$103 million. That includes plant assets like the office and warehouse, lines, poles and transformers. We again have more inventory than typical to mitigate long lead times and possible material shortages in 2023. Our equity is at 37.6%. All our ratios exceed lending requirements. The cooperative finished 2022 with 229 new accounts. We surpassed 15,000 total service accounts in 2022.


This year, at the beginning of their session, the legislature passed and the governor signed a law requiring utilities to be carbon-free by 2040. Municipals and cooperatives have an interim requirement of being 60% carbon-free by 2030 and by 2040 all utilities that generate electricity must be 100% carbon-free. Great River Energy, REA's wholesale power provider, is responsible for meeting these standards and projects to be approximately 35% carbonfree in 2023. Meeting these new standards will not be easy or inexpensive. Significant investment in new generating sources, battery storage, and transmission lines to move the power will be required. At the current time, long term battery storage technology is not yet available. Currently, most battery storage is good for only 4 hours. Great River Energy has a contract with a company, Form Energy, working on developing longer term battery storage. There is still much to be learned about the impact of this bill. Great River Energy and Runestone Electric are committed to doing everything we can to keep electricity safe, reliable, and affordable.

After nine years on the board of directors, District 6 Director Clif Patrick has announced his retirement from the board. Clif was an early adopter of residential wind energy, and is a former dairy inspector. With his inquiring mind, he often brought insightful questions for discussion in the board room. We will miss him at our meetings but wish him well with his plans for the future. Thanks for your years of service to Runestone, Clif.

I encourage you to come to the Annual Meeting to learn more about these subjects and other things happening at your cooperative. We are once again offering a \$25 Gift certificate per membership attending the meeting to use at REA-member businesses. You can also join us in celebrating the eighteen students who will receive \$1,000 scholarships. We look forward to seeing you on April 27th!






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Net Margin 601 2,546




REA net margin and patronage capital allocated from GRE and other associated organizations.


Revenue Per kWh Sold Cents/kWhs Sold




OUTAGE HOURS DUE TO MAJOR STORMS



**TIER** Time Interest Earned Ratio




REA's ability to pay its interest expense. (1.25 Minimum) Equity %



## 2022 MIGHLIGHTS


### **Operation Round Up**<sup>®</sup>

### System Improvements

In 2022, we spent \$500,000 on right-of-way clearing, changed out 242 poles, plowed in 21.9 miles of new underground cable, converted over 11 miles of overhead wire to underground cable, changed out 305 old transformers, added 229 new electric services, and much more.
