



A Note from the CEO

Residential rates to increase on average 3.8% in 2026

A year ago, I shared with you that wholesale power costs were projected to increase by 7.6% in 2025, and that's exactly what happened.

Since increases in wholesale power costs are beyond our control, we passed this additional cost through by adding it to the wholesale power cost adjustment (WPCA) on members' bills.

We have utilized the WPCA for many years. We start each year with a base, and then the WPCA can vary each month based on additional charges or credits on our power bill from Great River Energy. The WPCA is applied on a per kilowatt-hour (kWh) basis to energy sold and varies among different rate classes. For 2025, the WPCA base for general service accounts was 1.63¢ per kWh. As this number has increased over the past few years, we felt it was necessary to roll the WPCA into the actual rates. In 2026, the general service rate will increase from 9.69¢ (11.32¢ with the WPCA) to 11.70¢ and the WPCA will reset to zero.

In addition to the energy rate increase, rising costs have led us to increase the monthly fixed charge from \$52.50 to \$55.00.

On average, a residential or seasonal account will see an increase of approximately 3.8% or \$5.58 a month. All other rate classes will be adjusted accordingly.

The primary drivers for this rate increase are rising wholesale power costs and inflation of everything from construction materials to insurance. We cut

REA Board of Director Meeting Highlights - November 2025

- » Mrs. Nelson reviewed the Financial Report for October 2025 noting the October margin is close to budget and year-to-date kWh sales are 3.5% under budget.
- » Selected Director Winter to accompany the auditor to the warehouse for an optional inventory count in January.
- » Reviewed participation in REA's EV program, water heater program, cycled cooling/air-source heat pump program, and crop drying profile.

- » Adopted amendments to the Section 125 Cafeteria Plan for 2026, per federal law, allowing an increased Dependent Care Flexible Spending Account limit from \$5,000 to \$7,500.
- » Mrs. Nelson and CEO Haman presented the 2026 draft budget and answered questions from the Board. The final budget will be presented at the December board meeting.
- » **The regular January Board Meeting will be Tuesday, January 27, 2026.**

What is required to be a REA Director?

REA Bylaws Article III, Section 7. Director Qualifications.

No person shall be eligible to become or remain a director of the Cooperative who:

- (a) is not a bona fide member of the Cooperative receiving electric service from the Cooperative in the district that the director represents or would represent if elected;
- (b) is not a bona fide resident of the district from which he or she is elected or for which he or she is a candidate; (bona fide resident shall be defined as occupying and continuously and materially purchasing electric service at a location within any director district from which the director is elected or for which he or she is a candidate for at least nine (9) months each calendar year);
- (c) is in any way employed by or substantially financially interested in an enterprise substantially competing with the Cooperative or any Cooperative-affiliated business;
- (d) within five (5) years preceding a director candidate's nomination was or during service on the Board of Directors is adjudged to be guilty of a felony;
- (e) within five (5) years preceding a director candidate's nomination was a full-time employee of the Cooperative;
- (f) within five (5) years preceding a director candidate's nomination was an employee of a statewide association of electric cooperatives, an electric generation and transmission cooperative, or any other entity in which an electric cooperative is a member.
- (g) within five (5) years preceding a director candidate's nomination or during his or her term if elected was or becomes employed by a labor union which represents,

has represented, or has endeavored to represent any employee of the cooperative;

- (h) is a close relative* of an incumbent who is not up for re-election at that time;
- (i) is a close relative* of an employee of the Cooperative;
- (j) is or becomes the full-time employee or agent or, who is or becomes the full-time employer or principal of, another director;
- (k) does not have the capacity to enter legally binding contracts;
- (l) is absent from three or more regular meetings ("Unexcused Absences") of the Board of Directors during any consecutive twelve month period, unless excused for good cause (an "Excused Absence") by the Board. If a director participates in more than one regular meeting during any consecutive twelve month period by electronic communication, that director shall be considered absent from that meeting for purposes of determining the number of the director's Unexcused Absences, unless the attendance by electronic communication is approved for good cause by the Board.

*A "close relative" is a person who is by blood, law, or marriage (including half, step, foster, and adoptive relations) a child, grandchild, parent, grandparent, or sibling; or is a spouse or resides in the same residence.

A member that is an authorized farm corporation or family farm corporation may select an individual member residing on or actively operating the farm to be eligible for election to the board.

Snowmobile Safety Tips



- » Watch out for power poles and electrical equipment that can be hidden in the snow.
- » Power poles are often anchored with wires extending out from the pole. Avoid snowmobiling directly next to or underneath power lines.
- » Slow down, know the area and stay on marked trails.
- » If you see a downed power line, stay away from it and call 911 to report it. Always assume it is live and can carry currents strong enough to kill.
